Newcomer's 1.5 Generation

This report is the story on newcomer's children who live in PEI. I researched their country, their problems at school and their life on PEI. The first sequence is newcomers from Afghanistan.

Afghanistan is a land of great mountains, scorching deserts, rolling plains and fertile valleys. A landlocked country in Asia, it is bordered by Pakistan in the east and south, the former Soviet Union in the north and west, and China in the northeast.

Afghans to Canada - For 10 years, ending in 1989, Afghanistan was occupied by the Soviet Union. Since then, it has been torn apart by civil wars based on religious and ethnic divisions. Since 1980, small numbers of Afghanis have been admitted to Canada as refugees or as immigrants. Most of them have settled in the Toronto region. For all Afghanis settlement and initial adaptation will be affected by the experiences many of them suffered before coming to Canada. They had experienced war personally and had been separated from family members during the war. Many were confined to refugee camps for several years. Some people returned to their country after the withdrawal of the Soviet forces. Perhaps they were refugees for a second time as a result of the civil war. Now there are about 25 Afghani people in PEI. Most of them are learning English at the LINC and their children are studying at public schools. (Continued on Page 3)

The Palestinian Legend Dies

The paradox of life, "I fight for my own territory and die far from my land."

Yassir Arafat, President of the OLO and the alliance for liberation of Palestine died in France at 3:30 am French time. The Arab nations are having 40 days of mourning and the flags are flying at half mast.

Arafat could have been born in Gaza, Jerusalem and even in Cairo in August of 1929 but his birthplace remains a mystery. He was the son of a retailer of Gaza. He began studying in Egypt where he began his militant life during his life as a student. Abut Amat was the military name of this man of the two Arab-Israeli wars at the end of the 40's where he was a student leader – to the 50's as a guerrilla – to the 60's as a terrorist and to the 70's as a political leader of the Liberation of Palestine. To start a newspaper called the New Citizen is a great idea. It is really nice to see the students from 14 countries working together as a team to produce this paper. They have divided themselves in groups to deal with a variety of issues that they want to print. As a result of this newspaper, they are learning English, computer skills, and a lot about each other. All of the students appear to be sharing ideas and are really enthusiastic about the New Citizen. Thank you Kamal for introducing the idea of a newspaper to the rest of the students.

MAPLE-GLAZED TURKEY

4 Tbsp. butter at room temperature

1 Turkey, 12-14 lbs., thawed if frozen.

3/4 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper.

1 recipe wild rice fruit stuffing

2 shallots minced

2/3 cup maple syrup

1/4 cup white wine or chicken broth

1 tsp. dried thyme

Preheat oven to 450 F

- Grease 1.5 gl baking dish. Rub 3 Tbs. butter over turkey; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Fill turkey body and neck cavities with some of stuffing. Transfer remaining stuffing to baking dish. Cover with foil. Refrigerate. Place turkey on rack in roasting pan; roast 20 minutes.
- Reduce over temperature to 375 F. Roast turkey, basting every 30 minutes with pan juices, until meat thermometer inserted into thickest part of thigh resisters 180 F for 2 hours.
- In pot over medium heat melt remaining butter. Add shallots, cook for 2 –3 minutes. Add syrup, wine and thyme. Bring to boil. Cook until slightly thickened.
- Baste turkey with glaze several times during last 30 minutes
- Place covered dish with stuffing in oven 35 minutes before turkey is done. Remove foil after 15 minutes.
- Ready to serve in about 4 hours

Plantains Are Nutritious

The plantain grows in warm weather in the Equatorial zone. This vegetable is very nutritious because it contains iron. The color is green and then it turns yellow. The green plantain is used to make soups and creams specially for the babies, older people and students. This is very nutritious and delicious.

The yellow plantain is also used to make cake. **Plantain Cream Recipe** (6 servings)

Ingredients:

4 cups water (1litre)

4 cups milk (1litre)

1 cup sugar (250 ml)

1 big green plantain (or two small)

Cinnamon (Add just a few)

Preparation

Put water in a pot until it boils.

Then put this mixture into the boiling water and stir it with a spoon. Add sugar cinnamon and milk. Keep it boiling for about 20 minutes don't forget to stir continuously.

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Palestine Legend Cont.

This protagonism begins in 1959 with the creation of the Alfata guerillas, which means conquest. In 1968 the OLO and Arafat took control and organized a Palestinian town to recover occupied states. Yassir continued to organize the resistance against Israel, Lebanon, Egypt, Kuwait and Tumez. These areas were their main focus of operation. From Jordan , it was expelled by the troops of King Hussein in which became known as black September in the 1970's. From Lebanon, it was also expelled by the Israeli army that invaded the region in 1982.

The 27 years of exile of Arafat culminates in 1997 when the provisional government of the territories of Gaza returns to Gaza to maximize the Palestine Authority. But to govern is not easy and in 8 years, the wearing down of its government, the economic crises and corruption of several of their collaborators caused regression in any possible peace accord. The leader did not have the capacity to restrain extremist groups and this was often interpreted as a lack of will toward peace. As a result, the international community ignored Arafat in a great part.

The life of Arafat begins to diminish when he is removed fro his military quarters by international human rights. He was quickly transferred to France for Medical treatment in early November. This was one war that Arafat could not win. His death was announced on Thursday, November 11 at 3:30 French time.

He died under military siege with the uncertainty of what would happen to his town, always hoping for a free, independent Palestine State. He died, a man adored like a God, hated like a terrorist and loved like a man toward a child.

I visited Colonel Gray High School for the interviews. The people who I interviewed were in the E.S.L. class. I met them in their class. Most of them told me their main problem was English and that they missed their country. But the rest were all good. They have a dream for their future. They are going to try to succeed and believe that they will succeed if you give them a hand.

All of the newcomer's children love their motherland. They dream about their hometown, their friends and their childhood every night. They awake from their dreams and know that they have English problems. If we love them, we must have much more concern. We have to love each other, understand each other and help each other. That is the best because we are the only ones in Prince Edward Island.

Survey Results

All of the students missed their own country. The students ranged in age from 16-19 and all live with their families in Charlottetown. Their dreams for the future include becoming a nurse, a pilot and going to university. Their desires included visiting other Canadian cities, playing soccer and making good friends.
